A huge well done to the children in Year 2 for achieving the Young Leaders Award! We are all really proud of the work you have put into achieving this throughout the year.










Recommended Read for KS1: *What's the Weather*? by Fraser and Judith Ralston



Recommended Read for lower KS2: A Day in the Life by Mike Barfield and Jess Bradley




Theatre, and delve into the secret diaries of a Viking, Isaac Newton's cat and the wooden panel that became the Mona Lisa.
